# **Elections Office Statement**

## **Our Mission**

To provide with integrity, general direction and supervision over the registration of voters and the administrative conduct of free and fair Elections in the Virgin Islands; and to impart efficient, reliable and courteous service to the General Public in the process.

## **Our Functions**

- To conduct General Elections, By-Elections or Referendums
- To maintain an accurate voters' list
- To educate the public about the electoral process in the Virgin Islands
- To administer the areas of the Constitution as it relates to Elections
- To train Election Officers in the election process
- To report to the Governor and Deputy Governor on all Election matters.

# **Future Goals**

- Introduction of voters' registration cards or national identification cards. (National IDs will be done in conjunction with Passport Office)
- Continuous training of Election Officers.
- Securing new accommodation for Elections Office which would include proper storage for election equipment and additional space for preparation of election, added security and room for growth.
- Improvement to election procedures and equipment
- Additional amendments to the Elections Act
- Creation of an Elections Website.
- Continuous education of the Public on election laws and procedures.

# **Executive Summary**

The success of the 2011 General Elections was due to the support given to the Office of the Supervisor of Elections (Elections Office) by many governmental organizations, private local businesses, the media and the public. There were no major incidents and the complete operations went through smoothly.

The electoral process began early in 2009 with the revision and update of the Elections Act under the directorship of the Law Reform Commission with the Supervisor of Elections as an integral member. The amendments (No. 14 of 2011) were passed by the House of Assembly just weeks prior to the commencement date for the 2011 General Elections. The time frame within which preparations had to be finalized was significantly reduced; so this was a major challenge for the Elections Office. However, with the dedicated staff and cooperation from stakeholders, preparations were completed on time.

Registration for the General Elections continued up to September 15, 2011 and saw a record number of young voters being registered to vote, especially during the last two days of the registration and transfer process.

The House of Assembly was dissolved on September 13, 2011 and an election date was set for November 7, 2011. This commenced the election period which climaxed at November 30, 2011 as the staff finalized the process.

There was an increase in the number of candidates who contested seats for the 2011 General Elections when compared to the 2007 General Elections. A total of 43 candidates, 27 in the Local Electoral District and 16 in the Territorial Electoral District were nominated on Nomination Day, October 24, 2011.

Two changes were made with the venues of the polling stations. The Catholic Community Centre was used in place of the Ashford Waters Community Centre

in the ninth district and the Abraham Leonard Community Centre in place of the Leonora Delville Primary School in the first district.

Additional Election officers were employed in support of the new arrangement to have territorial votes counted in the local districts, thus contributing to the increase in expenses for the election. This was a first time arrangement.

On September 19, the Preliminary list of voters was published with a slight adjustment to numbers on the final voters list. Total registered voters for the 2011 elections were twelve thousand six hundred and nine (12,609).

Advance Poll was held on November 4, 2011 in all nine districts and was extended for an additional two hours beyond 12:00 noon, thus closing at 2:00 p.m. A record number of incapacitated and elderly voters exercised their right to vote at the polls with friends to offer assistance where needed. Six hundred and fifty-three (653) persons voted in the Territorial Electoral district and six hundred and fifty-four (654) in the Local Electoral district.

On Polling Day, the polls opened at 6:00 a.m. at all polling stations with the exception of the third district. With the exception of Anegada which closed at 5:30 p.m., all polls closed at 6:00 p.m. The early closing in Anegada was to accommodate air transportation of election officers and ballot boxes to Virgin Gorda.

The counting of all votes –local and territorial – were conducted in the districts. Counting of local district votes began at 7:30 p.m. and finished at around 11:00 p.m. Territorial votes were counted immediately following the local district counts and concluded around 8:30 a.m. on November 8, 2011. The local districts reported their counts at intervals to the Elections Headquarters at the Sir Rupert Briercliffe Hall. The declaration of the four emerging Territorial candidates was announced by the Returning Officer of the Territorial district, Mr. Raymond Phillips and the declaration of all candidates for the House of Assembly was announced by the Supervisor of Elections, Ms. Juliette Penn.

Regional and international Observers were assigned as observers of the Virgin Islands 2011 for the first time. The seven-member Observer Mission which was led by Ambassador Rudolph Collins, was comprised of four (4) from the United Kingdom and three (3) from the Caribbean Community (CARICOM). They verbally expressed their satisfaction with the entire elections process prior to their departure from the Territory.

# 1. Introduction

The electoral process started in earnest as early as 2009. At that time the Law Reform Commission was given the task of updating and revising the existing Elections Act to bring it on par with the 2007 Constitution and to clarify and make portions of the Act more user-friendly.

Preparation on the process of Voters' ID Cards began in 2010 with the purchase of ID equipment and upgrading of the voters' list database.

An initiative for the Elections Office was to acquire new security devices to use to secure the ballot boxes.

General Elections in the Virgin Islands were constitutionally due no later than November 12, 2011. The House of Assembly was dissolved on September 13, 2011 and Elections Day was announced for November 7, 2011.

Preparations were made with registration drives, public education and continuous voter registration.

Election Observers were assigned to observe the process of elections in the Virgin Islands.

# 3. Registration

Registration of voters in the Virgin Islands is a continuous process and has been since 1990. Persons who are eligible to register to vote are qualified in accordance with the Elections Act 1994 and Amendments and the 2007 Virgin Islands Constitution Order. Persons who attain the age of 18 years and otherwise qualify as a voter can apply to be registered.

Update of the Voters' List is continuous; and one of the processes of updating is the removal of deceased persons from the list. Following the 2007 Elections, up to the 2011 Elections, a total of three hundred and sixty-six (366) persons were deleted from the list.

For the period 2007 to 2010, the registration of voters was low. There were a total of 246 applications for registration and transfers. With the beginning of the 2011 election year, the registration process increased with applications totalling 1,940; of these, 840 applications were received and processed on the final two days of registration, September 14-15, 2011.

With the 2011 Elections (Amendment) Act coming into force so close to the date by which Elections were constitutionally due, there was a great challenge for the Elections Office to receive and process the large number of applications received. There was limited time to conduct required screening and background checks. However, with the passing of the Elections (Amendment) Act No. 14 of 2011, it is expected that the challenge to process a large quantity of applications in an election year will somewhat be reduced as the Voters' list will be revised by September 30 of each year. The first revision will be done in 2012.

Several factors contributed to the vast increase in voter registration. The Territory's young people showed great interest in becoming registered voters. The increase was also a result of the many registration drives that were conducted by the political parties, the educational ads by the Elections Office via Government Information Service and the news media. An increase in the voters' registration can further be attributed to the 2007 constitutional amendment which affords more persons born outside the Virgin Islands to parents from the Virgin Islands to acquire belonger status.

On September 19, 2011, the Voters' Preliminary List was published. It was posted at the Elections Office and other designated areas for inspection for a period of four (4) days. There were a total of twelve thousand six hundred and fifty-six (12, 656) voters on the Preliminary List.

During the inspection period of 4 days, a total of ninety-two (92) claims and twenty-one (21) objections were submitted. The reasons for the claims were correction of names, occupation and addresses. The objections were about deaths, persons being registered incorrectly or in the wrong districts. Most of the objections failed as no evidence was produced to show that the persons were not correctly registered or transferred. All claims and objections were dealt with administratively.

A total of 47 persons were removed from the 2011 Preliminary Voters' list because of death or duplication. The Official Voters' List was published in all nine (9) districts on October 5, 2011 with a total of 12,609 persons listed.

# 4. Issue of WRITS

Pursuant to Section 24 of the Elections Act 1994, the issuance of the Writs of Election were signed and issued by His Excellency, the Governor Boyd McCleary, CMG, CVO on October 3, 2011. The Writs signalled the dates for Nomination Day and Polling Day which were October 24, 2011 and November 7, 2011 respectively.

Writs were issued to the Returning Officers for the nine Local electoral districts and the Territorial electoral district. Notices were posted in all districts as required by law. **(See Appendix III for Writs of Election)** 

# 5. Information and Public Relations

Public relations activities for the 2011 General Elections were coordinated by the Department of Information and Public Relations in collaboration with the Communications Officer, Miss Aisha Hill of the Deputy Governor's Office. Public relations campaigns incorporated a series of information sessions to guide stakeholders in personal ethics, professional conduct and elections procedures during the election campaign. The information sessions targeted public officers, the public, the local media, electoral candidates, agents and students of H. Lavity Stoutt Community College. The Official Gazette was also used to publish information on General Elections. The Department of Information and Public Relations provided live media coverage of the results of the elections from the Sir Rupert Briercliffe Hall ( the Headquarters of the Elections) on the evening of November 7, 2011.

Throughout the electoral process, the media representatives in the Virgin Islands worked closely with the Office of the Supervisor of Elections and assisted greatly in disseminating information. The contributions made by the radio stations, online media, television networks and the newspapers were greatly appreciated and applauded. The public was sufficiently informed throughout the entire process.

# 6. Observers

On October 27, 2011 the Supervisor of Elections was informed that seven (7) international observers would be coming to the Territory to observe the 2011

General Elections. There would be four (4) observers from the United Kingdom (UK) and three (3) from the Caribbean Community (CARICOM).

The delegation of observers was led by Ambassador Rudolph Collins, a retired Diplomat in the Foreign Service of the Republic of Guyana.

The UK Observers met with the Supervisor of Elections on Thursday, November 3, 2011. During the meeting the Supervisor of Elections became acquainted with the Observers, their duties and expectancies. Identification Cards (IDs) were issued to each of the Observers at the Election Office on November 3, which allowed them to go into the Advance Polls on Friday, November 4, 2011 and Polling Day on November 7, 2011.

The Observers from the Caribbean arrived in the Territory on November 4, 2011 and visited the Elections Office on Saturday, November 5, 2011 to meet with the Supervisor and Deputy Supervisor of Elections. The Head of the Mission briefed management on their expectations at the polls with respect to the conduct of Election Officers and voters at the polls.

The Caribbean Observers were also issued IDs which enabled them to visit the Polling stations on November 7, 2011.

The Observers were helpful, kind and did exactly what they were assigned to do – "observe". They visited all the polling stations on Monday, November 7, 2011 and most or all of the counting stations.

On Tuesday, November 8, 2011 at 10:00 a.m., the Supervisor of Elections met with His Excellency Boyd McCleary, CMG, CVO, Deputy Governor, Mrs. Inez Archibald and the Observers at the Governor's Office. The Observers gave a verbal preliminary report to His Excellency in which they expressed satisfaction with the electoral process and the overall conduct of the 2011 General Elections. The Supervisor of Elections, the staff of the Elections Office and all other Election personnel received high praise for a job well done. The Observers also expressed satisfaction with the Elections being free, fair and of a high standard.

On the evening of Tuesday, November 8, 2011, His Excellenct the Governor hosted a cocktail farewell reception for the Observers. The Supervisor of Elections and all Election personnel were invited. At the reception His Excellency and the Observers again thanked the Supervisor, Deputy Supervisor, Elections staff and all other Elections personnel for a job well done. (See Appendix XII for Biographies of Observers)

# 7. Nomination of Candidates

Nomination Day was held in all nine districts on October 24, 2011. Forty-three (43) candidates were nominated. Twenty-seven (27) candidates were nominated for the nine Local electoral districts seats and sixteen (16) candidates were nominated for the four (4) Territorial electoral seats. This was an increase of eight (8) candidates from the 2007 General Elections when there was a total of 35 candidates. (See Appendix VIII for list of candidates nominated).

A total of twenty one thousand (\$21,000.00) was collected at the close of nomination. This sum was deposited to the Government of the Virgin Islands account at Banco Popular by the Elections Office.

Thirty (30) of the nominated candidates were nominated by the Territory's main political parties: The Virgin Islands Party (VIP) thirteen (13); The National Democratic Party (NDP) twelve (12); The People's Patriotic Alliance (PPA) four (4); and The Party of the People (POP) one (1). The thirteen (13) other candidates were Independent candidates.

Nomination Day was conducted in an orderly and efficient manner with the full cooperation of all persons concerned.

There was only one (1) minor incident on Nomination Day. The nomination station in the seventh (7<sup>th</sup>) district was inadvertently closed for lunch at 12:00 noon instead of 1:00 p.m. This was reported to the Supervisor of Elections and the situation was immediately rectified.

# 8. Preparation for Elections

The Elections Office made all the necessary preparations to meet the deadlines needed for Polling Day. These included publishing of Preliminary Voters' Lists and Official Voters' Lists, assignment and training of Election workers and printing of poll books and ballot papers.

The ballot papers and poll books were printed at Caribbean Printing Company. The ballot papers were printed in the presence of the Supervisor of Elections, Mrs. Juliette Penn and several police officers. This operation commenced at 9:30 a.m. on October 25, 2011 and was completed at 1:30 a.m. on October 26, 2011.

The polling stations were inspected and a few changes in location from the previous General Elections were made. The polling station in the Valley was moved from the Ashford Waters Community Centre to the Catholic Community Centre. This was a welcomed change by the residents of Virgin Gorda. In the first district, the polling station was moved from the Isabella Morris Primary School to the Abraham Leonard Community Centre and was also a welcomed change to persons in the first district.

Returning Officers were selected by the Supervisor of Elections and approved by the Governor and Deputy Governor. The Deputy Governor appointed the officers in accordance with Regulation 2 of the Public Service (Delegation of Powers) Regulations, 2011 (S.I. 2011 No. 61). All the other officers were appointed by the Supervisor of Elections after the approval of the Governor and Deputy Governor. The Supervisor of Elections also acted under the powers

# delegated by the Governor in accordance with Regulation 2 of the Public Service (Delegation of Powers to the Supervisor of Elections) Regulations, 2011 (S.I. 2011 No. 60). (See Appendix IV for the Appointment of Election Officers).

Meetings and training sessions were held for all Election Officers in preparation for the General Elections.

Handbooks and guidelines with clearly defined roles were prepared for all Election personnel; Returning Officers, Presiding Officers, Poll Clerks, Tally Clerks and Counting Officers. All officers were required to attend training sessions which were conducted by the Supervisor and Deputy Supervisor of Elections. At the meetings and training sessions, election personnel were encouraged to perform their duties with integrity and without fear or favour, thus ensuring free and fair elections administered with professionalism and transparency.

Returning Officers also met separately with their Presiding Officers and Poll Clerks to discuss their work plans.

On October 28, 2011, a meeting was held at the Road Town Methodist Church Hall with all prospective candidates and agents. This meeting provided an opportunity for any questions or concerns by candidates and agents to be addressed. For the first time handbooks were prepared and issued to candidates and agents. Copies of sample ballots were also distributed to party and independent candidates.

# 9. Advance Poll Day

Advance Polls were held in all nine (9) local districts with one polling station in each district on Friday, November 4, 2011, three (3) days before Polling Day.

With the amendments to the Elections Act, No. 14 of 2011, Advance polling was extended for two additional hours to close at 2:00 p.m. instead of 12:00 noon. The extension was a direct result of the increase in the number of elderly and incapacitated persons who attended the advance polls in 2007.

All polls opened at 9:00 a.m. and closed at 2:00 p.m.

Polling stations on Tortola were visited by the Supervisor of Elections as well as the Deputy Supervisor of Elections.

The incapacitated and the elderly turned out to the polls in record numbers. It was observed that a large number of persons who were unable to mark their ballots for whatever reason arrived at the polls with friends to mark their ballots for them. This went very well as the Presiding Officers and agents did not have to take as much time from their post to assist persons to vote.

The challenge of determining elderly was clarified in the 2011 amendments to the Elections Act where the elderly was specified as persons seventy (70) years and older. There was a large turnout at the Advance Polls with a total of six hundred and fifty-three (653) persons in the Territorial Electoral District and six hundred and fifty-four (654) persons in the Local Electoral Districts voting in 2011 compared to 418 in the Territorial Electoral District and 421 in the Local Electoral District in 2007. (See Appendices V and VI for Advance Poll-Ballots cast)

The advance votes were lodged with the Supervisor of Elections where they were secured until Polling Day. All advance ballots were accounted for and placed in their respective ballot boxes before voting officially began on November 7, 2011. The advance ballots were delivered to the Returning Officers on November 7 with the exception of the Returning Officer for the ninth district who received her ballots on Sunday, November 6, 2011. Those ballots were lodged at the Valley Police Headquarters for safe keeping.

The Elections Office was once again faced with the difficulty of persons being disenfranchised because of their inability to vote in the Advance Polls. These categories of persons were government workers committed to attending conferences overseas, persons with appointments overseas and persons with committed vacations already paid for. (See # 13 for recommendations)

# 10. Polling Day

Packing of election material, checking of ballot boxes and verification of travel arrangements by sea and air were all completed by late Sunday night, November 6, 2011.

Election Officers began to arrive at the Elections Office as early as 4:00 a.m. to check and collect boxes in readiness for the opening of poll at 6:00 a.m. This posed a problem because of the traffic and congestion inside and outside the Office. It brought a greater awareness of the importance and urgency of storage requirement at the Office to deal with ballot boxes; more particularly the packing and inspection process.

By 5:30 a.m. all Returning Officers were at their polling stations. The Elections Office acquired for the first time a fleet of vehicles to be used by the Returning Officers to transport all election material on Advance Polling Day and Polling Day. All election officers were accompanied by Police personnel. These police officers remained at their designated stations throughout the day.

Not all polls commenced at 6:00 a.m. The third district opened at 6:30 a.m. due to an oversight in collecting some of the elections material from the Elections Office. There was also a problem with the keys to access the building. Despite the difficulty, the polls were able to close on time.

Voting was overwhelming in all districts throughout the entire day. There were long lines at most polling stations, particularly the third, fourth, sixth, eighth and ninth districts. Additional tents were erected at the third, fourth and eighth districts to accommodate the long lines.

## (See #13 for recommendations)

All polling stations were visited by the Supervisor of Elections and or the Deputy Supervisor of Elections.

The Returning Officer of the seventh district suspended voting for approximately half an hour in an effort to acquire another poll book at the polling station. Despite the unfortunate incident, the poll was still able to close at 6:00 p.m.

The Anegada poll closed at 5:30 p.m. This was to accommodate the daylight period for transportation of Elections officers and ballot boxes by air from Anegada to Virgin Gorda.

For the first time in the history of elections in the Virgin Islands, the elections were observed by a team of official observers; four (4) from the United Kingdom and three (3) from CARICOM. The observers visited all nine polling stations. Throughout the day they interacted with voters, elections personnel or simply just observed the machinery of the Virgin Islands election process.

There was no poll at Salt Island; however, a boat was stationed at the island to accommodate any voter who wished to travel to the Road Town Polling Station to vote. No one came from Salt Island or the surrounding cays.

Generally, Poll Day went well despite the few challenges that were experienced. Elections workers for the most part performed well and to the highest level. The observers were particularly interested in the procedures for the opening and close of the polls.

At the close of the polls, all ballot boxes were sealed and those that needed to be transported to designated counting stations were transported in the company of Police Officers and or candidates and agents who were free to travel in convoy.

# 11. Counting of the Votes

History was made when the Territorial Electoral at-large votes were counted in their respective districts. This was a result of the Elections (Amendment) Act No. 14 of 2011.

In accordance with the amendment, the district votes were to be counted and candidate declared elected before Territorial votes could be counted.

The counting of the district votes began at 7:30 p.m. in most districts with the exception of the third district whose counting began at 8:00 p.m. The results of the district votes were reported to the Elections Headquarters in a timely manner. Live coverage of the election results was sponsored by the Office of the Supervisor of Elections and the Department of Information and Public Relations. This was another first occurrence in the electoral process of the Virgin Islands.

As the results were received, they were displayed by the Territorial Returning Officer and Technical support personnel on a giant display screen at the Sir Rupert Briercliffe Hall. All of the results for the Local districts were completed between 10:30 and 11:00 p.m, the third district being the final results to be received.

The counting of Territorial district votes began as soon as the Local district counting was completed. Although some of the results were relayed within a reasonable time frame and the final results were completed within a shorter time period, it can also be said that the level of control by the Territorial Returning Officer was lacking. Because the counting was not centralized, some decisions which needed to be made by the Territorial Returning Officer had to be made by the Local district Returning Officers. Some other decisions that would have been made by the Supervisor of Elections also had to be made by the Local district Returning Officers.

Concerns were expressed that although the counting was done in districts, the results were not completed as speedily as expected. In some instances, some of the results took a longer time to complete. Perhaps if they were centralized where different decisions could be made, the returns would have been made sooner.

The Local district counting and some of the Territorial counting were for the first time observed by International observers. Mr. Thomas Docherty, MP, one of the observers who was at the Election Headquarters was quite satisfied with the reporting process. He also concurred to interviews with the media representatives present at the Headquarters.

The counting of the Territorial votes was completed by 8:30 a.m. on November 8, 2011 with the last results being reported from the fifth district.

The declaration of the Territorial candidates was made by Returning Officer, Mr. Raymond Phillips and the official declaration of all candidates elected to serve in the House of Assembly was made by the Supervisor of Elections.

The debate on the counting of Territorial votes in districts or centrally continues, because both have been experienced. All the pros and cons needs to be examined carefully and a decision made on whether to continue counting in districts or return to central counting of the territorial votes. The Office of the Supervisor of Elections and the Government need to devise a way to have the votes counted in a manner that is faster than the one currently being used; whether there is a move towards electronic counting or having several counting stations if the Territorial counting continues in the districts and that Territorial and District counting be done simultaneously. The Returning Officers and Counting Officers should be commended for their diligence in counting the votes; however, if the Territorial votes continue to be counted in districts, more election personnel will need to be appointed, particularly Returning Officers.

Throughout the counting of the votes there were no reported incidents. It can be concluded that the counting was free and fair. (See Appendix X for Election Results)

# 12. Return of Writs

In accordance with Section 55(1) of the Elections Act, all Writs and Returns of Elections were submitted to the Supervisor of Elections on Tuesday, November 8, 2011.

The Writs and Returns of Elections in accordance with Section 55(3) of the Elections Act were submitted by the Supervisor of Elections to His Excellency the Governor, Mr. Boyd McCleary, CMG, CVO on November 8, 2011.

# 13. Financial Report

Due to the counting of the Territorial Electoral Votes in districts, the number of personnel required for counting was increased; thus, an increase in Election expenses.

Increase in voters, more ballots, advertisements and television live coverage of election results also attributed to increased costs.

A total of one hundred and ninety-three thousand seven hundred dollars (\$193,700.00) was allotted to Elections Office in the 2011 budget. One hundred and fifty-eight thousand six hundred and fifty-one dollars and fifty-eight cents

(\$ 158,651.58) of the allotted budget was spent during the election period ( September – November 2011). (See pages 27-29 for a breakdown of the expenses).

# 13. Recommendations

- 1. Ramps should be available at all polling stations to facilitate easy access by physically challenged voters.
- 2. A building with storage and other security measures should be identified for housing the Elections Office.
- 3. Additional polling stations should be added in the third and fourth districts.
- 4. New technology should be introduced to process ballots cast in the local and territorial districts.
- 5. The Elections Act needs to be further amended and consolidated. Every effort should be made to ensure that amendments to the Act are concluded at least one year before General Elections are constitutionally due giving sufficient time to implement changes and train Election Officers.
- 6. Provision should be made in the Elections Act for electronic tallying in addition to the manual tallying which will provide for timely and accurate checks and balances as the tally sheet would be set up in spreadsheets with appropriate formulas.
- 7. The existing provision in Section 52(1)(C) of the Elections Act for two of the tally clerks to be poll clerks should be repealed. The responsibility of tallying is tedious and requires persons who are alert.

- Consideration should be given to purging the voters' list in an effort to more accurately reflect the number of eligible voters in the Virgin Islands. In some jurisdictions, if registered voters have not voted in a set number of elections, their names are removed from the voters' list.
- 9. An electronic copy of the Official voters list should be available at every polling station so that entries can be easily made on the electronic poll book and also for ease of reference. This would significantly reduce the need to verify registered voters with the Elections Office.
- 10. Provision should be made in the Elections Act for the Poll Book to be kept electronically as well as manually. This will assist if a decision is taken to purge the voters' list. It will also retain the record of persons who voted and allow for reports of the number of voters who need to be removed after a set time to be generated.
- 11. Section 52 (1) (f) and (2) needs to be further clarified as there appears to be some ambiguity regarding which ballots should be rejected.
- 12. Due to the increase in voters, the larger polling districts should be allocated at least two (2) polling stations. This would help to reduce the long lines and be less burdensome on the Election workers. The Polling Divisions of concern are Sea Cows Bay, Road Town, Huntums Ghut, West End, Baughers Bay, East End, Long Look and The Valley. The list of polling stations can be divided alphabetically; for example: voters with surnames beginning with A-L would be assigned to the first polling station and voters with surnames beginning with M-Z would be assigned to the second polling station.
- 13. Process and implementation of voters registration cards need to be revisited early and a decision made on the way forward.
- 14. In an effort to better accommodate persons being disenfranchised

because of their inability to vote in the Advance Polls (in particular, government workers committed to attending conferences overseas, persons with appointments overseas and persons with committed vacations already paid for) the Elections Act should be revisited to allow persons who were caught in these circumstances to be able to vote at the Advance Polls, provided they would not be travelling before that date.

- 15. The Voters List should be offered for sale as a means of offsetting costs.
- 16. Counting of the Territorial votes should remain central, but with additional counting stations and counting officers.
- 17. If the current decision of counting territorial votes in districts is upheld, then the recommendation would be that counting of local and territorial votes be done simultaneously with separate set up stations for local and territorial counting and additional provision made for the assignment of more counting officers and tally clerks.
- 18. Nomination fee should be increased to \$1000.00.
- A code of conduct for candidates should be drafted and incorporated in the Elections Act.
- 20. All political parties should be registered with the Elections Office and an application form and certificate of registration be incorporated in the Elections Act.
- 21. Rules should be drafted to regulate electoral campaign financing.
